From the Headmaster

Observation!

"Above all, watch with glittering eyes the whole world around you because the greatest secrets are always hidden in the most unlikely places. Those who don't believe in magic will never find it!" from *The Minpins*, a fantasy story for children by Roald Dahl.

As you will all know, Roald Dahl was a Welsh-born (of Norwegian parents) British writer of the most amazing stories for children (and adults), *Willie Wonka and the Chocolate Factory* and *The Twits*, *James and the Giant Peach* and *Matilda* being amongst the best-known. Would you believe that he even wrote the screenplay for the film of James Bond in Ian Fleming's *You Only Live Twice*!

I took that quote from Dahl because every now and then I think about the depersonalisation of society through mechanisms and gadgets that draw individuals into their own little worlds, seemingly shutting them off from all that is going on around them.

I don't think I'm a Luddite. For those who can't recall, the Luddites were those textile artisans in the early nineteenth century who banded together to smash the new looms in the belief that they would lose their jobs as those jobs became mechanised; they also believed that looms were instruments of the Devil.

I don't think I'm a Luddite but I do despair from time to time about the amount of time young people spend plugged into iPods and similar electronic diversions. I do not want to smash the iPod but I wish the users would occasionally take them out to 'drink in' the pleasures of nature and regain a sense of awe and wonder.

Creativity has its place and where would we be if we allowed no technology at all. Whether we like it or not, we are surrounded by the successor to the transistor and solid-state circuitry to the point where the things in life we take for granted would not exist if it were otherwise.

What I find hard to swallow, however, is that, despite their protestations, those who seem not to be able to survive without being plugged in take themselves out of circulation as far as other people are concerned. I was always led to believe that living in society was about inter-relating or even about the occasional period of silence that allowed you to contemplate.

These days it seems that unless every waking moment is filled with 'clamour', nervousness and agitation set in! Someone once wrote a lovely song entitled 'Silence is Golden'! I wonder why that sentiment seems to have been lost in the lists of time.

There is no doubt that there is a sharp edge to life these days that was not evident when I was young, an edge that encourages people not to allow strangers' eyes to meet theirs as they pass each other in the street or sit on a tram or move around a public space. Something about community life has been lost as a consequence, though. Perhaps the retreat into one's own world for fear of meeting the gaze of another encourages people to plug in to their earphones and pretend that no-one else exists. How sad!

Many of us have watched with delight as Nam Le (OM96), has been awarded, first, the Pushcart Prize, the Michener-Copernicus Society of America Award, and fellowships from the Iowa Writers' Workshop, the Fine Arts Work Centre in Provincetown, Phillips Exeter Academy, and the University of East Anglia. and now the UK's largest literary prize, the very prestigious Dylan Thomas Prize worth £60,000 (AUD? Anyone's guess!) for his debut short-story collection, *The Boat*. He is currently the non-fiction editor of the highly-regarded *Harvard Review*.

From the Chaplain

All Faiths and None

Prince Charles recently celebrated his 60th birthday. The possible future king of England has stated that he plans to change the title, "Defender of the Faith" to simply "Defender of Faith" if or when he ascends the throne. The Prince believes the change more truthfully reflects contemporary Britain's multicultural society. The monarch of England is also the supreme governor of the Church of England and as head of the church has been known as "Defender of the Faith" since the 16th century when the title was bestowed upon Henry VIII by the Pope Leo X in 1521. Henry wrote a pamphlet attacking Martin Luther's reforms and supporting the position of the Pope and the Catholic Church. The Pope was so pleased he gave Henry the title. A few years later when Henry asked permission to divorce his wife Catherine of Aragon and marry Anne Boleyn, the Pope refused. Henry was furious his request was turned down and promptly rejected Papal authority and ordered the Archbishop of Canterbury to declare his marriage invalid so he could go ahead and marry Anne Boleyn. He established the 'Act of Supremacy'(1534) which made the English Monarch the 'supreme Head of the Church of England'. Henry didn't deny the Pope's authority but claimed he had no jurisdiction in England. Later monarchs, affected by Protestant reforms, had a different attitude to the primacy of the Pope.

Charles may believe the simple grammatical change in the title is largely symbolic but he may underestimate the power of symbols. There will be many who will object to the change because it rips the title from its historical moorings and implicitly rejects Christianity as the religion of the United Kingdom. Anglicanism in England enjoys the status of the 'established' religion of the realm and this move by the Prince would inevitably place it as simply one religion among many.

England is very multicultural these days and there are cities in England where the majority of the population are Muslim. The prince may be adopting a politically correct stance or he may truly believe that faith, expressed in a variety of ways, is important and that as King he would be the monarch to all his subjects of any faith or none. As an Anglican, I don't mind if he makes the change or not and I like the idea that he thinks all people of faith are important, regardless of religion or denomination. I don't think the Anglican Church needs to be defended and I rejoice that the Prince takes seriously the spiritual dimension in all of life however it is expressed. Nevertheless, I don't think people can be 'generally religious'. Religion needs to have a certain content and form and for me, that

is the Anglican branch of Christianity. Yet the sight of particular branches of the church, and particular religions, fighting among themselves has managed to persuade too many young and not so young people to avoid the church and reject its teachings. They therefore miss out on the 'solid joys and lasting treasures' that a life with God can bring.

Dr Michael Hewitt-Gleeson frequently sends interesting emails. Michael is the Principal of the School of Thinking and he is a member of the School's Leadership Advisory Council. I found the following 'Did you know?' email from Michael of particular interest because as educators we often grapple with the increasingly rapid advances of technology and the impact it has and will continue to have on our student's lives.

Did you know?

- China will soon become the #1 English speaking country in the world.
- 25% of India's population with the highest IQ is greater than the total US population.
- The top ten in-demand jobs in 2010 did not yet exist in 2004.
- We are currently preparing kids for jobs that don't yet exist, using technologies that haven't yet been invented in order to solve problems that we don't know are problems yet.
- One in eight couples who wed in the US in 2007 met online.
- There are over 200 million registered users on MySpace. If MySpace were a country it would be the 5th largest in the world between Indonesia and Brazil.
- Currently, there are 31 billion' googlers' every month. In 2006, there were 2.7 billion.
- The first customer to receive a commercial SMS text message was in December 1992. In December 2008 the number of text messages sent and received every day will exceed the total population of Planet Earth.
- How long has it taken evolving technologies to reach an audience of 50 million?
 - RADIO took 38 years.
 - TV took 13 years.
 - WWW took 4 years.
 - iPod took 3 years.
 - Facebook took 2 years.
- In 1984 there were 1000 internet devices. In 1992 there were 1000.000 internet devices. In 2008 there are 1,000,000,000 internet devices.

- A week's worth of The Melbourne Age contains more information today than a person was likely to come
 across in a lifetime in the 18th century. In 2008 the amount of unique information generated will be more
 than all the information of the last 5000 years.



Year 9 and 10 Physical Education Exam Online

Over the past two years the Health and Physical Education Department has been developing the Physical Education end of semester exam online. The delivery of the exam online has several advantages including more effective assessment of student's tactical awareness, decision making and their ability to solve tactical and strategic based problems. These higher order thinking skills are aspects that have been covered in your son's physical education class during the game sense component of the course this semester. Students knowledge of strength and conditioning principles, skill development and technical aspects of topics covered throughout the semester are also examined.

In conjunction with Physical Education classes students are provided with a thorough revision sheet on each of the topics covered during the semester. This revision sheet is available on your son's physical education class portal page. Students are encouraged to start revising now for the Physical Education Exam.

The Physical Education Exam will be conducted during exam week and will be available through a link on your son's physical education class page on the MGS portal from Tuesday 25th of November. Your son will have until 4:00pm on Friday 28th of November to complete the exam. In order to complete the exam students will be required to login using their MGS email address and entering their student identification number as their password. The student identification number appears under the barcode of each student's MGS Student ID Card. If your son is unable locate his student ID number, he is able to request a new password on the login page of the exam. His new password will be emailed to him. It is imperative that students use **Internet Explorer** to complete the exam.

'Cyber criminals target Facebook users'.

The Age (10.11.08) reports that Saved

Facebook has been infiltrated by Nigerian scammers and other cyber criminals who use compromised accounts to con users out of cash.

It seems that sites such as *Facebook* allow scammers to research and target victims more effectively and avoid having their messages blocked by spam filters. There are a number of viruses which, once installed on a computer, send back to the hacker a detailed log of everything entered using the keyboard, including online banking details and passwords for services such as *Facebook*.

Typically, the victim receives a *Facebook* message from a friend with a subject such as "LOL. You've been catched on hidden cam, yo" or "Nice dancing! Shouldn't you be ashamed?". The body of the message contains a video clip link that appears to go to a legitimate site such as *Facebook* or *YouTube* but, when clicked on, it takes the user to a bogus web page. Before the users can play the video they are told they need to download a video player upgrade, which is in fact a password-stealing virus.

The next time the victim logs into *Facebook* the malware-laden message is sent to all of their friends and the infected link is automatically added in comments on friends' pages. Other less sophisticated attacks on *Facebook* members use spam emails, some appearing to come from *Facebook* itself, to spread viruses.

In September security firm WebSense reported on spam emails, purportedly sent from an @facebookmail.com address, that tell the victim they have received an invitation from Facebook to add a friend. "The spammers included a zip attachment that purports to contain a picture in order to entice the recipient to double-click on it. The attached file is actually a Trojan horse," WebSense said.

Students' and Staff members' computers at MGS are protected from downloading possible Virus or Malware by a system of daily and sometimes hourly, updates which are automatically installed whenever the student or staff member logs in to the MGS Novell network. This is one of the good reasons why it is so important that all computers used at school are imaged with the current approved school image.

Careers Centre Services for Year 12s post-VCE Results

All Year 12 students will by now have received a package from the Curriculum Office and the Careers Centre providing information about the coming examination period, VCE results and Change of Preference information. Whilst all the details are included in the package, students and parents should be aware that the Careers Centre will operate for the week of December 15 – 19 to assist students who may wish to make changes to their tertiary preferences. Contact details as well as a list of advice days and hotlines operated by various tertiary institutions are included in the package. It is recommended that students wait until receiving their results before contacting the Careers Centre to make an appointment. This is because some students find they need a little longer to digest their results before making changes whilst others are in need of assistance immediately. Maximising flexibility in appointments allows us the opportunity to provide the best service to students. It is however possible to make appointments in advance if the student is likely to be out of Melbourne for part of the week. Parents and students can be assured that all those needing advice or assistance during Change of Preference week will be accommodated.

"Gap" opportunity in China 2009

Australian Business Week – Opportunity for a 2009 Year 12 student

University of Melbourne – Master of Engineering: Guaranteed Entry

Changes to engineering education at Melbourne mean that students with strong maths and problem solving skills and inquiring minds have been able to set a path towards a five year engineering program through the Melbourne Model.

The combination of a three year undergraduate degree in Biomedicine, Environments, Commerce or Science followed by a Master of Engineering leads to accreditation, and is attractive to students as they graduate with a higher qualification than a double degree program.

For students unsure about entry to the two year Master of Engineering, the University has approved guaranteed entry into the Master of Engineering on a Commonwealth supported place (CSP) for students who achieve an ENTER (or equivalent) of at least 95.

All students proceeding to the Master of Engineering must also achieve a 65% average in the final two years of their undergraduate degree.

The guaranteed CSPs provide important security for high achieving students and take away the uncertainty of moving from an undergraduate degree to a Masters degree.

This may be of particular interest for Year 12 students considering studies in engineering, but who are not sure about whether to enrol in a four year Bachelor of Engineering or the five year Melbourne Model program.

ATO TFN: Tax File Numbers

Year 12 students are reminded that they <u>cannot</u> enrol in a CSP (Commonwealth Supported Place) –formerly HECS paying university course without a Tax File Number (TFN). There are enough issues to deal with at the time of enrolment without the added hassle of collecting documents to make a Tax File application. Using the Tax File Education system relieves students of the necessity to provide documentation when applying for their TFN as the school provides verification of personal details. Students merely complete the application and include either their Birth Certificate or Passport number and return it to the Careers Centre for verification of name and address details and forwarding to the ATO.

Please note: The ATO generally takes a number of weeks to process applications and corresponds directly with the applicant after the application is received. The Careers Centre is not informed of the student's Tax File Number although we are happy to provide confirmation of the lodging of applications if requested.

The Tax File Number is also essential for any student undertaking part-time employment or receiving dividend income. Therefore, for a variety of reasons, it is highly advisable that every Senior School student should apply for a Tax File Number







Tutor/Filmmaker: Fiona O'Connell is a graduate of RMIT's Media Studies degree, Fiona started her career in television, working as a copywriter and editor for the regional broadcaster WIN Television Victoria in 1998. Now a writer/director and editor, Fiona's work includes short films, commercials, music videos and corporate productions. She has also edited and assistant edited on various television programs and independent documentaries. Her short films, With Hope' and the 'The Road Ahead' have screened at film festivals in Australia and abroad including the Sydney Film Festival, St Kilda Film Festival, Flickerfest, Sao Paulo International Film Festival and Palm Springs Shortfest. Course 2—Machinima Filmmaking, with Dale Linegar

Machinima filmmaking within a real-time, 3D virtual environment is a new form of filmmaking that uses Second Life or computer games technology to shoot films in the virtual reality of Second Life. Rather than working with expensive camera equipment or spending months animating every element in costly 3D packages, Machinima creators act out their movies within Second Life or a computer game. Players make use of existing avatars, or game characters and environments as the actors and sets for a type of virtual puppetry that they complete with the addition of voiceovers. Machinima artists can also make use of Second Life to build unique characters and worlds for their work. Students will be encouraged to submit their films to the Australian Centre for the Moving Image (ACMI) Machinima Film Festival which runs in February .

Tutor/Filmmaker: Dale Linegar

Dale explores the potential of Second Life with students at both Victoria University and RMIT. Over the past couple of years he has run the MGS Second Life Club and conducted the Avatar Youth Project. This is an online community of young people creating, building and interacting in Teen Second Life. Avatar is a program to get young people interacting and working in the 3D environment of Teen Second Life. By bringing together people from many disparate parts of Melbourne we hope to facilitate social interaction and provide a fun learning environment.

Toorak Uniting Church Dancing Class 2009

Toorak Uniting Church has conducted the Dancing Class now for more than 40 years. Social dancing, including traditional and modern ballroom styles, is taught by a well-qualified, enthusiastic team of instructors under the direction of Nathan Strange. The classes are conducted from the floor and with the use of a radio microphone and modern equipment, staff readily establish a rapport with the students. Almost 100% attendance is maintained throughout the two school semesters involved. Students are encouraged to mix socially in a polite and relaxed manner and enjoy the experience of learning to dance.

The young people attending the classes come from a wide range of schools and there is a unique mix of students, which encourages the formation of new friendships. The classes are usually limited to 40 girls from Year 9 and 40 boys from Year 10. They are well supervised and students are issued with a laminated entry card incorporating a passport type photograph which is presented each night on arrival. A roll is maintained and an attendant randomly telephones the homes of pupils not present if prior notification of absence has not been received.

In 2009 the Toorak Uniting Church is conducting classes over both school semesters, the first over terms 1 and 2 and the second over terms 3 and 4. These classes will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday evenings in the first semester and Tuesday or Thursday evenings in the second semester from 8.00 to 9.30 p.m. There are 8 lessons in each semester and if there is sufficient demand there will be an additional class in the second semester. A non-refundable deposit of \$50 is required upon enrolment application. Classes are not held over the school holidays, or while school camps take place and every endeavour is made to fit around school activities.

Bookings are now open for our 2009 classes. Please complete the attached form and return it with a \$50 deposit to the Church as soon as possible. Places will be allocated in all classes in order of receipt. If your child has a particular friend with whom they would like to attend, please return both forms (with identical class preferences listed) and cheques in the one envelope to ensure they are allocated to the same class. You will be advised of the result of allocations as soon as possible. The total fee is \$190 including GST for eight one and a half hour lessons.

A formal dance is held at the end of the course in each semester. These dances are well supervised and the guidelines for student behaviour established at the Dancing Class apply. Admission is by a separate pre-purchased ticket and only members of the Dancing Class may attend.
